FUNDAMENTALS FOR EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION

The Fundamentals for Early Care and Education classes provide you with a foundation in child development and developmentally appropriate practices. It is for all working with groups of children ages birth to eight years old. The course introduces entry-level professionals to the core knowledge areas.

Knowing what children are typically capable of at various stages of development will help you provide environments and experiences which are age appropriate, decrease frustration levels of children and challenge children to become the best they can become. This course is recommended for those who are new and not so new to the child care profession. It is for those working in child care centers and family child care homes. It fulfills the state licensing requirements for all new center staff without comparable education. Embedded in the Fundamentals course is Basic Specialized Care, the necessary first step in becoming a Specialized Services Provider. The Fundamentals course is a great first step in pursuing a Child Development Associate (CDA) credential as well as a good bridge to prepare for college level work. All providers who successfully complete the course and have worked in the field for one year can apply for a Level I certificate and receive a \$100 bonus. Working on your CDA? This course provides you with 45 hours of training in the necessary areas.

FEEDING THE DEVELOPING BRAIN

The more we know about the food and brain connection, the better choices we can make about the diet. Starting several million years ago, we had enough additional caloric energy through changes in lifestyle and diet to actually build a completely new section of brain. This new brain, the prefrontal cortex, plays key roles in memory, attention, perceptual awareness, thought, language, and consciousness. How this structure is best fueled? What are the ramifications of the brain not receiving its daily requirements of nutrients? This presentation looks at the food sources required to optimize the brain.

Participants will be guided through the 4 steps of IPDP development, including self-assessment, developing goals, identifying strategies and resources, and creating realistic timelines.
